



#### Dear Parents, Pupils and Friends of St. Clare's

"The children now love luxury. They have bad manners, contempt for authority; they show disrespect for elders and love chatter in place of exercise."

I will tell you who this quote is alleged to be from later.

I thought long and hard about my speech and what I should focus on for this year. I was reminded of an assembly I did this year. I was also reminded of the fact that my house is now full of three 6 foot teenagers. Finally, I was reminded of a chance meeting with an old school friend whilst on holiday in France.

By way of a Facebook post showing off that I was holidaying in the West of France an old school friend from nearly 30 years ago messaged me to point out that I was actually only 20 minutes' drive from his home. So I took the plunge and drove over to see him. I was actually quite nervous of this chance reunion and started to doubt whether we would hit it off or whether we had deteriorated physically and mentally so much that we would embarrass ourselves or that we had nothing left in common. Well it turned out to be no such thing on any account – we instantly picked up where we left off, caught up with each other's lives and reminisced about our teenage life together whilst belly laughing about some of the scrapes we got into. We also realised how things seemed important when we were young which are now have proved trivial and insignificant.

And that is the subject of my speech today – **Being A Modern Teenager.** 

I think modern young people get a rough deal with the media:

- They are told:
  - O if GCSE results go up they are too easy;
  - o if GCSE results go down they are less clever than previous generations; and
  - O if they stay the same why are they not improving?
- We are told they are on street corners getting ASBOs
- We are told they are taking drugs and getting pregnant
- We are told they are smoking and drinking to excess

I will return to this theme after a brief report on the successes of young people of the last academic year.

They have already made a great start – I am certain they will have a positive influence for the remainder of this year. Hannah and Megan certainly intimidate me when they come into my office with pads and sharpened pencils!

This year, as ever, outstanding results were achieved at **Advanced Level**. The school was very successful in helping its A-Level students secure the university places of their choice in a wide range of courses.

Our pupils outperformed figures taken from across all UK state schools, selective and non-selective.

100% of all grades were passes for the 5<sup>th</sup> year in a row compared to the Welsh average of 97%. This puts us top of all Cognita schools across the world. The pass rate at A-A\* was 34% compared with 25% in Welsh state schools. We are now the top performing UK school in the Cognita group by all raw measures.

However, the most important statistic for me is our Value Added (i.e. how much PROGRESS pupils make). This remains at an impressive +0.2 grades per pupil per subject putting St. Clare's 2<sup>nd</sup> in Cognita Group.

There were excellent performances by students across all subjects. I would like to publically acknowledge the drive and determination of Mr. Davies in History, Mrs. Williams in Textiles and Mrs. Howe for Business Studies for impressive and consistently high Value Added statistics over a three-year period.

**At GCSE Level** – we deliver English GCSEs at St. Clare's In unreformed GCSEs:

% A\*-C grades = 93% (up from 88% last year)

The new reformed GCSEs with their numbered grades also fared well:

Maths pass rate (4+) = 81% (cf 71% nationally)

• Eng Lang (4+) = 85% (cf 70% nationally)

• Eng Lit (4+) = 100% (cf 73% nationally)

We have an amazing Value Added:

- (from Y7 to GCSE) of +0.7 and
- (from Y10 to GCSE) of +0.6

This is the highest by some margin of all the Cognita schools and now means that the combined VA at the end of A-Level is +0.9. This means, on average, every student gets just about one grade more than is expected from pupils of their ability: this means BBB rather than CCC, or AAA rather than BBB. This means better courses at better universities and better prospects for employment.

Particular congratulations to Mrs Williams and Mrs Corthine on excellent Art results this year - raw VA of +1.6 and Drama +1.4. It is also noteworthy that Business Studies VA was ranked 7<sup>th</sup> out of the 167 schools in the UK who retuned GCSE data. Mrs Howe continues to produce excellent results for her pupils.

In fact, nearly every subject achieved significant positive Value Added.

**Prep:** their results show that they are half a year ahead for a child of their ability in Maths, English & Science – which means they hit the ground running in Year 7. I should like to congratulate Mrs Davies (our Y3 teacher) and her pupils in particular for much higher than expected progress in both English and Mathematics.

By any criteria one might wish to apply, these were excellent results.

Our thanks go to all of our pastoral and academic middle leaders for the thorough work they do and advice they give to our young people.

I wish to extend my heartfelt thanks to the entire school community for their part in our successes this year: Cognita, the teaching and support staff, the Friends of St. Clare's who do so much to improve the environment for the children, you the parents and of course the pupils.

So I return to my earlier quote:

"The children now love luxury. They have bad manners, contempt for authority; they show disrespect for elders and love chatter in place of exercise."

That sounds pretty damning. However, I like to deal in facts.

According to government statistics:

- Teenage pregnancy rates since 1971:
  - O in U20s has halved;
  - O in U16s has fallen by 33%;
- Teenage alcohol consumption in 11-15 yoy fallen from 61% in 2003 to 38% in 2014;
- Teenage smoking rates have fallen from 18% to 5% in 11-16 year olds between 2001-14;
- Teenage drug consumption in 11-15 yoy between 2001-14:
  - o "ever taken drugs" DOWN from 29% to 15%;
  - o "taken in the last year" DOWN from 20% to 10%;
  - O "taken in last month" DOWN from 12% to 6%;
- Teenage arrest statistics in U18s from 2006 2016:
  - O Average youth custody population DOWN from 2,800 to <1,000;
  - O Arrests down by 75% since 2007.

There are similar figures for declining racist / homophobic / xenophobic incidents in this generation.

You also need to take into consideration that this generation of young people:

- Are the most over examined cohort of pupils in the World;
- Are having to deal with the most disruptive change to their exams/and curriculum since the 70s;
- Are having to cope with pressure inducing university offers that turn out to be over inflated come results day;

- Are having to cope with being told they are 'underperforming' according to PISA leagues tables when they are not;
- Are coping with being under 24-hour scrutiny through social media with seemingly no let-up even when they are at home;
- Are under more pressure and stress than previous generations; and
- Are more likely to suffer mental health issues .

I know St. Clare's pupils are less likely to have contributed negatively to any of the types of statistics I have quoted but the point I am making is clear. They are the best behaved, most enlightened, most cohesive, most tolerant and most accepting of any generation.

I would remind the young people in this room that they have more influence than they realise. If the 18-25 demographic had turned out in greater numbers than voted at the last General Election and EU referendum, then we may have had very different outcomes.

It is evident from the extensive list of academic, artistic and sporting achievements you can read in this newsletter from our own young people that we as adults continue to underestimate them and shame on us for doing so.

Adults should take heed – we need to really cherish this generation and continue to support them to fly. It is possibly not too controversial to add that the statistics I gave are also due in part to an improvement in the quality of parenting over the generations.

The quote I gave you earlier was from none other than Socrates allegedly spoken circa 400BC. It would seem underestimating young people is nothing new! Our young people continue to progress and adapt – the elders continue to stagnate and see the glass half empty.

I would urge young people to try to buck this trend as they themselves grow into adults and care for teenage children.

Enjoying relative success, they decided to make a go of this possible magic career and now tour the country on a regular basis and are currently touring with *More Magic For Kids* their second kids show and *Time Travelling Magicians* a full evening show. They are known nationally and indeed throughout the magic community for the quality and originality of their shows and are pleased to be able to call both Derren Brown and Dynamo friends and fans of theirs.




