Dear Parents,

Christmas Sometimes at the Headteacher can feel a little Scroogelike. remember this experience for the rest of their lives as I have with my special moment. What makes this extra special and therefore St. Clare's extra special is that it uniquely involved pupils from Year 2 to Year 13. This is what an all through education can offer the children and the school.

She also became PSE coordinator for KS3 and revolutionised the way PSE is delivered at the school. Her legacy will be long lasting and she will be hard to replace. I know she worked well with Mr. Martin and he will miss her too. We wish her and her family the very best in their new adventure. Mrs. Barnard will take over the reins of girls' PE and Games for the remainder of the academic year and a permanent replacement will be recruited in the Spring term ready to start in September 2018. I will teach Year 8 Maths until the end of the academic year.

"Oh, the Thinks you can Think, when you think about Seuss!" These were some of the first lyrics heard in St Clare's production of SEUSSICAL THE MUSICAL. And boy, what thinks were brought to life on the stage in this fresh, fun, and family friendly musical.

You'd have to be living on another planet not to at least be somewhat familiar with the source material for this show, a collection of some of Dr. Seuss's most iconic stories. It was truly a thrill to see these beloved characters come to life on the stage. For those not familiar with the musical, it is a mash-up, of sorts, of the stories of Horton the Elephant, Gertrude McFuzz, Jojo the little Who with big thinks and all those that they encounter in their crazy Seuss-fuelled adventures. 
Sam Chumley had the question of the day and a "gold star" from the charismatic and ever popular lecturer Prof John McRae. Sam's question was:





After School Club

We offer an After School Club for all pupils at the school. This means that your child can be supervised in a safe and secure environment every day of the school week until 5:30pm.

To enhance the enjoyment of the extended school day, various multicultural and play-based activities are provided by the staff to create a relaxed yet stimulating environment for holistic development.

For **Infants** these include; table top and floor games which develop the imagination and helps the children to communicate with one another; creative activities which help to develop their manipulative and design skills; role play opportunities which enable them to re-enact familiar stories and practise their social and imaginative skills. The children sometimes also relax by watching a DVD on the large flat screen TV.

For **Juniors** these include; board games such as 'Monopoly', 'Snakes and Ladders' and Connect 4 which enable the pupils to develop their understanding of number, tactics and co-operative play; socio-dramatic opportunities in which the pupils select from an assortment of props to enhance their play and interaction with one another; quiet areas where they can complete homework, read books or just relax.



All pupils can play outside, weather permitting, and enjoy the school grounds. On special occasions during the school year, there are additional activities such as cookery and clay.

We endeavor to meet the pupil's individual needs and to promote their welfare and enjoyment through the opportunities provided.

Christmas Lunch at St Clare's


